The CNMI State Workforce Development Board (SWDB) formerly known as the State Workforce Investment Board, is responsible for assisting the Governor in performing the duties and responsibilities required by the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act of 2014. All members of the SWDB are appointed by the Governor and represent the many facets of workforce development. It is represented by leaders from business, labor, higher education, economic development, youth activities, employment and training, as well as the legislature. The SWDB's goals revolve around providing opportunities for qualified individuals to earn livable wages, have upward mobility in their careers, obtain workforce credentials, to develop their skills through training, and/or become career or college ready. The SWDB also aims to create a data driven workforce environment that aligns components within the workforce system, and inventory and align the workforce skills needs of private sector employers and businesses with the education, service, and training provider offerings.

## PERFORMANCE REPORT

Effectiveness in Serving Employers and Workers: The CNMI SWDB through the CNMI Department of Labor, in particular the DOL Workforce Investment Agency (DOL WIA), worked closely to support and improve opportunities for both employers and workers before and during these challenging times, through the following activities:

#### 2020-2023 WIOA State Plan.

The SWDB focused on the State Workforce Development planning process and successfully secured the CNMI's 2020-2023 State Workforce Development Plan.

### Grant Support.

The SWDB extended its support for the following grant applications:

- 1. State Apprenticeship Expansion (SAE), a USDOL Office of Apprenticeship Grant, now awarded to the Northern Marianas College.
- Youth Apprenticeship Grant (YAG), a USDOL Office of Apprenticeship Grant

#### Ongoing Activities.

The SWDB extended its support for the following DOL WIA Activities:

- WIOA Funding for PY/FY 2020-2023;
  - Estimated to support over 150 individuals each year;
- National Dislocated Worker Grant Extension;
  - Continued to serve over 50 up to December 2020
- Awarded Covid-19 National Dislocated Worker Grant;
  - a. Ongoing grant revision to increase support for Covid-19 temporary employment from 44 to 400 and an additional 270 to receive education and training in areas of need.
- 4. Apprenticeship State Expansion (ASE) Grant:
  - Ongoing recruitment of Employers and Incumbent Employees

### Workforce Resource Fair.

The SWDB held a Workforce Resource Fair for members of the community affected by the Covid-19 Pandemic. Over 202 individuals were reached through this event.

#### Restructuring of SWDB Committees.

The SWDB restructured its committees in order to align policies, procedures, programs, activities, responsibilities, and funding to the State Plan. The new committees are:

  - a. Reviews Eligible Training Provider Applications and submits recommendation to the overall SWDB;
  - Assists with the review of Work Experience Program applications and submits recommendations to the Department/Division; and
- 4. Planning, Assessment, Evaluation and Research Committee:
  - Leads planning process for CNMI State Plan;
  - Provides recommendations for Assessment and Evaluation Process;
  - c. Recommends Research Projects

# SWDB Finances...

The SWDB receives most of its funding to run its programs and services through the formula funded Workforce Innovation and Opportunities Act (WIOA) of 2014 and/or other discretionary grants as applicable. The WIOA funds allow for programs to use the revenue provided over a 3-year Program (July 1 - June 30) or Fiscal Year (October 01 - September 30) Periods: The breakdown for funds received from WIOA follows:
