Who are we?

The Commonwealth Election Commission was created under Public Law 12-18, as amended which was codified in Title 1 Division 6 of the Commonwealth Code. It was created to establish procedures and requirements of voters and the conduct of elections within the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

The Commission shall have nine (9) members appointed by the Governor subject to the advice and consent of the Senate. Five members shall be residents of Saipan and the islands north of Saipan, two members shall be residents of Rota, and two members shall be residents of the islands of Tinian and Aguiguan. No person may be appointed a commission member who is not a registered voter of the Commonwealth.

The Commonwealth Election Commission's Executive Director is Julita A. Villagomez, who serves at the pleasure of the Commission. Including the Executive Director, CEC's full-time staff consist of six employees. Eight months prior to election the commission hires Ten (10) temporary employees to assist in preparation and closing of election.

Mission

To ensure a fair, honestly, orderly and impartial election process.



WHO QUALIFIES TO REGISTER?

A person is eligible to vote who meets the following qualifications as provided in Title 1 Division 6 § 6201.

- 1. A citizen or national of the United States
- Who, on the date of election, is 18 years of age or olderDomiciled in the Commonwealth for 120
- days prior to the election
 4. Has not been declared by a court to be of
- 4. Has not been declared by a court to be of unsound mind
- 5. Not serving a sentence for a felony

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

NORTHERN MARIANAS DESCENT REGISTRY (NMDR)

Northern Marianas Descent Qualification

A person of Northern Marianas descent is a person who is a citizen or national of the United States and who has at least some degree of Northern Marianas Chamorro or Northern Marianas Carolinian blood or a combination thereof. For purposes of determining Northern Marianas descent by adoption, a child without any degree of Northern Marianas descent when adopted while under the age of eighteen by a person of Northern Marianas descent shall not acquire any degree of Northern Marianas descent. For purposes of determining Northern Marianas descent, a person shall be considered to be a full-blooded Northern Marianas Chamorro or Northern Marianas Carolinian if that person was born or domiciled in the Northern Mariana Islands by 1950 and was a citizen of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands before the termination of the Trusteeship with respect to the Commonwealth.

Any person who has less than one quarter Northern Marianas Chamorro or Northern Marianas Carolinian blood or a combination thereof, claiming to be a person of Northern Marianas descent shall provide evidence to support that he/ she possess some degree of Northern Marianas Chamorro or Northern Marianas Carolinian blood or a combination thereof to the Superior Court. Based on the evidentiary standard of "preponderance of the evidence", the Superior Court may grant or deny such claim, and the decision of the Superior Court on such claim shall be subject to a "de novo" judicial review. However, if the Superior Court finds and agrees that the person in fact possesses at least some degree of Northern Marianas Chamorro or Northern Marianas Carolinian blood or a combination thereof, the Superior Court shall certify that the person is a person of Northern Marianas descent.

To address the effects of the coronavirus on the election procuring cleaning supplies and personal protective equipment (masks, face shields, thermal scanners, etc...) to protect our Commonwealth Election Commission (CEC) employees and those visiting the polling sites. Additional costs will be incurred to disinfect polling areas, use of mailing and postages and tracking the increased number of absentee ballots and upgrading current voting equipment.





FUTURE OUTLOOK AND CHALLENGES

LOOKING FORWARD

In anticipation of future elections, The CEC continues to strive in:

- ⇒ Preparation of 2021 Special Election for a vacancy of House of Representative in Precinct 3
- ⇒ The Commonwealth Election Commission Board members to meet and address issues with election laws that need to be amended to ensure a smooth process.
- ⇒ Continuing efforts to register voters and Northern Marianas Descent
- ⇒ To conduct comprehensive training for all poll workers.

CHALLENGES

CEC confronts issues and barriers with:

- Validating the voter registry
- Increasing the number of registered Northern Marianas Descent
- Hiring of Temporary staff/poll workers
- Relocation of polling sites due to damages from Typhoon Yutu
- Power/water issues at all polling sites
- Flight delay for Rota ballots
- The processing of absentee ballots
